Another academic year has ended and although as a community we've had to face some challenges because of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, it has not slowed down Collin College.

### 1. Collin College holds pinning parades to honor Nursing and Allied Health graduates



- The college put together two recognition parades to honor more than 140 Nursing and Allied Health graduates.
  - **More than 60** graduating Nursing students were individually recognized for their diligence and achievement on **May 15**.
- More than 80 graduating allied health students from Dental Hygiene, Diagnostic Medical Sonography, Health Information Management, Polysomnographic Technology, Respiratory Care, Surgical Assisting, and Surgical Technology programs were also recognized on May 22.

### 2. Collin College and Texas Workforce Commission team up for COVID-19 Response Training

- Local businesses retooling their products and workforces in response to COVID-19 may be eligible to receive free training through Collin College thanks to **\$10 million** in Rapid Response Grants from the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC).
- The TWC set aside money from its Skills Development Fund to offer fast turnaround grants of \$50,000-\$250,000 for training related to the COVID-19 response.
- Grant applications have been streamlined so that the businesses who need training assistance for their full-time employees can receive it as rapidly as possible.

## 3. Collin College makes Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) donations from Health Sciences to help fill shortages at local hospitals

- Collin College loaned ventilators to Baylor Scott & White-McKinney and Methodist Dallas Medical Center to assist with the shortage of ventilators due to COVID-19.
- Additionally, the college donated PPE (masks, gowns, and gloves) to Baylor Scott & White-McKinney, Medical City Dallas, Methodist Dallas Medical Center, Parkland Hospital, Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital-Dallas, and UT Southwestern Medical Center to assist with PPE shortages caused by the virus.
- Collin alumni are also on the front lines of the COVID-19 pandemic as they manage critical care ventilators and provide therapeutic interventions for patients. Respiratory Care students receive extensive training in managing ventilators and treating cardiopulmonary diseases.

#### 4. Collin College announces Cameryn Clackler as the 2020 Student Employee of the Year

- Cameryn Clackler, a student assistant of the Theatre Department at Collin College, has been named the 2020 Collin College Student Employee of the Year. She was awarded the honor in a virtual presentation on April 20.
- Clackler helped run the box office and also served as house manager for the college's theatre productions. She provided leadership by serving as a student supervisor and providing training for volunteers and ushers. Clackler was described as the voice and face of the Collin Theatre Center.
- Clackler will receive her Associate of Arts degree in Liberal Arts with a focus in Theatre.

#### 5. Dr. Don Weasenforth announces retirement after 17 years at Collin College



- After 17 years of service to Collin College and its students,
  Dr. Don Weasenforth will retire at the end of May.
- Weasenforth first came to Collin in January 2003 as a professor of English as a Second Language (ESL) and later served as a professor of English Composition. Simultaneously, he was also a Collin student who played violin in the string ensemble.
- In 2011, he served as the dean of academic affairs for the Developmental Education Department, then as dean of academic affairs for the Plano Campus from 2013-2017. In 2017, he assumed the role of associate provost of instruction for Collin College, and in 2018 became the vice president/provost of the Frisco Campus.
- **Dr. Jon Hardesty**, vice president of academic affairs, has been appointed interim vice president/provost.
