Sexual Harassment

- Sexual harassment means conduct on the basis of sex that satisfies one or more of the following:
 - An employee of the recipient conditioning the provision of an aid, benefit, or service of the recipient on an individual's participation in unwelcome sexual conduct (quid pro quo);
 - Unwelcome conduct determined by a reasonable person to be so severe, pervasive, <u>and</u> objectively offensive that is effectively denies a person equal access to the recipient's education program or activity; or
 - Sexual assault as defined in 20 U.S.C. 1092(f)(6)(A)(v), dating violence as defined in 34 U.S.C. 12291(a)(10), domestic violence as defined in 34 U.S.C. 12291(a)(8), or stalking as defined in 34 U.S.C. 12291(a)(30).



Sexual Harassment: Sexual Assault

- Term "sexual assault" constitutes sexual harassment, with the following definition:
 - "An offense classified as a forcible or nonforcible sex offense under the uniform crime reporting system of the Federal Bureau of Investigation" (20 U.S.C. 1092(f)(6)(A)(v)).

Sexual Harassment: Dating Violence

- Term "dating violence" constitutes sexual harassment, with the following definition:
 - "Violence committed by a person—
 - Who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and
 - Where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors:
 - The length of the relationship
 - The type of relationship
 - The frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship" (34 U.S.C. 12291(a)(10)).



Sexual Harassment: Domestic Violence

- Term "domestic violence" constitutes sexual harassment, with the following definition:
 - "Felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim, by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common, by a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner, by a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving grant monies, or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction" (34 U.S.C. 12291(a)(8)).



Sexual Harassment: Stalking Definition

- Term "stalking" constitutes sexual harassment, with the following definition:
 - "Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to—
 - Fear for his or her safety or the safety of others; or
 - Suffer substantial emotional distress (34 U.S.C. 12291(a)(30)).
