

Course Syllabus

Course Title: Drawing with Color

Instructor: Nora Dorfer

Course Description: Take the principles and elements learned in Drawing I and now incorporate color-theory including hue, value, and intensities. Include light quality and relationships. Renderings will be done in color pencil workings from real life objects and situations.

Hours: 18 hours

Sessions: 6

Course Prerequisite(s): Drawing I

Course Objectives:

1. Learn to apply color theory to value drawings in order to replicate subject matter as it appears in nature
2. Become familiar with colored pencils and the techniques necessary to accomplish the appearance of a "dry" painted medium
3. Increase your powers of observation and accomplishments

Lessons:

- Session 1: Introduction to color theory; making a value scale, color sheet, and multiple techniques of colored pencil; practice small studies if time.
- Session 2: Small studies of intimate groupings of related objects in values or in monochromatic harmony.
- Session 3: Small studies of objects of color in related harmonies, ie. analogous, complementary, etc.
- Session 4: Work alone on colored paper provided by instructor.
- Session 5: Layering and heavy pigmentation to gain full intensity of medium.
- Session 6: Concentrated study of set-up to complete full page drawing.
