1. Spring Commencement is Marked with Multiple Ceremonies

- More than 1,000 graduates walked across the graduation stage for Collin College's Spring 2025 Commencement on May 16.
- The college held ceremonies at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m., making it the first time Collin has added a second spring commencement ceremony and the first time since the addition of winter commencement in 2018 that the college has expanded its graduation recognitions.



- The college made the expansion to allow more **family and friends** to watch their loved ones receive their well-earned degrees and certificates.

2. Texas Workforce Commission Grant will Boost Medical Assisting Program

- Collin College received a \$144,827 **Jobs & Education for Texans** (**JET**) grant from the Texas Workforce Commission in May.
- The funds will be used to purchase patient simulator devices related to identifying and responding to irregular heartbeats, properly placing IVs, and drawing blood.
- The JET program provides grants to buy and install equipment for career and technical education courses across the state.
- The grants were announced at a ceremony hosted by Collin College as a part of a group of grants worth \$580,758. Denton ISD and Dallas College were also grant awardees.

3. Record Number of Collin College Students Earn Texas SkillsUSA Gold

- Eleven Collin students took home gold medallions from the SkillsUSA
 Texas State Leadership and Skills Conference held in Corpus Christi in April.
- Gold award winners will compete in the upcoming **national SkillsUSA competition** this June in Atlanta, Georgia.
- This is the **third year** that Collin College students have participated in the competition, with **44 competing**.
- The group doubled the number of competitions that it won last year with gold awards in 3D Visualization, Automotive, Automotive Refinishing, Collision Damage Appraisal, Collision Repair Technology, Graphic Communications, HVAC, Photography, Technical Computer Application, and Welding.
- Overall, 23 students were awarded gold, silver, or bronze medallions.

4. Collin College Athletics has Multiple Reasons to Celebrate

- Alisha Nunley, a sophomore basketball player, and tennis players Cem Atlamis, Jose Castillo, Enrique Doldan, Minjae Kim, and Luke Stula were named Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) All-Americans this spring.
- Collin College Tennis competed in the men's and women's national championships in May, taking No. 3 and No. 6 respectively. The No. 3 finish was Collin College's highest finish by the men's team since 2013.
- Minjae Kim was named the Intercollegiate Tennis
 Association (ITA) Sophomore of the Year for 2024-25.

 Kim was ranked No. 1 in the nation in junior college
 play by ITA at the end of this regular season.
