This course will examine American art during the Gilded Age (c. 1870-1900). We will consider painting, sculpture, and architecture created by artists such as Thomas Eakins, John Singer Sargent, James McNeil Whistler, Louis Comfort Tiffany, Augustus Saint-Gaudens, and the firm McKim, Mead, & White.

**Brian de la Houssaye** grew up between El Paso and Tucson. His father was a horse cavalryman of the 7th Regiment, long after Little Bighorn. He used to listen to stories told by his grandparents about Indian raids in the late 1800s and family myths about having some Cherokee and, possibly, Comanche ancestry. DNA says otherwise. He had friends who were Chiracahua, Mescalero, White Mountain Apache and Tohono Oodham (Papago). As a young boy, searching for arrowheads at Hueco Tanks and Ft. Bowie, he became interested in the stories of the tribes, which further increased when his family visited the Custer Battlefield during one of their many camping vacations in the Rockies.

#### Go Pullman: The Era of Luxury Rail Travel in America

Pullman's entrance into this industry was a new innovation in manufacturing as well as luxury and marketing. The name, "Pullman," became synonymous with style and comfort, while the impeccable service of the Porters who catered to the passengers helped to define the era of luxury rail travel.

His vision also led to the creation of a master-planned industrial community south of Chicago, where employees lived in company housing and worked in the Pullman car shops. In this class, we will discuss the creation of the model town, the role of Pullman Porters, and travel during the golden age of passenger train service.

#### Rosie the Riveter and the Other Women Who Won World War II

During World War II, women entered the work force in unprecedented numbers. They built ships and planes and produced ammunition. They flew planes, served as nurses and communication personnel and even worked as spies. All Branches of the military utilized women in coding and de-coding, patrolling beaches, transporting men and supplies and driving and repairing vehicles of all kinds. The world changed after World War II for everyone, but more so for the women who produced war goods and kept the home fires burning.

**Karen Marcotte** is a retired Professor Emerita in History and Humanities and taught for 40 years in the Alamo Community College District (ACCD) in San Antonio. Her last 30 years were at Palo Alto College in ACCD where she was a founding member. During those years she chaired the Social Sciences Department, developed and taught curriculum for the majority of the History and Humanities classes. She and her husband are avid travelers and have recently relocated to McKinney to be closer to family.

#### Turmoil and Change: The 1960s!

This seminar course examines the emerging mood in America during the 1960s. The inclusive years of the 1960s begins with the election of John Kennedy as the 35th President of the United States in 1960 and concludes with the end of the Vietnam War on January 27, 1973. This entire period was, in fact, more than a time of change: it was a time of formation. More than 70 million young Americans of the postwar years – "baby boomers" - were coming of age and not liking the direction America was going.

This course specifically illuminates and illustrates how young Americans having experienced the conservative and lucrative post-war fifties with the advent of television, rock & roll, and superhighways, would eventually reject their parents America and any association with their parents' generation. This rejection included experimenting with new and radical ways of thinking that powerfully challenged the very fabric of American life. To be sure, many of the revolutionary ideas from the sixties are shaping life in the West today.

**Dr. John P. Williams** is a full-time Professor at Collin Colleges McKinney Campus. Prior to his teaching career, he worked in the corporate world as an information analyst and served in the United State Marine Corps. Dr. Williams's educational background includes an A.A. degree in Paralegal Studies, a B.A. degree in History, an M.A. in Teaching, and a master's in liberal arts. He finished his Ph.D. at the University of Texas at Dallas in 2020, which focused on Immigration to America, the First World War and the Lost Generation, and Nazi Germany and Holocaust. Currently, he is working on his first book and hopes to have it published in the near future.



#### HISTORY

#### Two Queens, One Throne (ONLINE)

Elizabeth was the illegitimate product of the unlawful marriage of Henry and Anne Boleyn. After Anne's execution, she was declared a bastard. Elizabeth had been named third in the line of succession, being only eligible to rule in the (unlikely) event of her siblings - Edward VI and Mary I – not having heirs, which is in fact what happened. Elizabeth chose to follow the Church of England and reversed Mary's attempts to turn the country Catholic. Those who had followed Mary into Catholicism were not supportive of Elizabeth as their sovereign. However, Elizabeth was a more competent politician in those troubled times. She refused to marry, being unwilling to cede authority to her husband, whomever he might be. Because she never married, she had no official heir. James VI of Scotland succeeded Elizabeth and became James I of England and Scotland, establishing the Stuart Dynasty.

Mary was the great-niece of Henry VIII, being the granddaughter of Henry's sister, Margaret. Mary was crowned Queen of Scotland at only six days old and was raised in France with her husband-to-be, Francis II. At 16, she was married to the Dauphin and crowned Queen of France. Mary's position as the only legitimate heir of James V and Mary of Guise solidified her royal status. As a Catholic ruler, she was significantly supported by the Catholics in England who were not happy with Elizabeth's return to the Church of England. Mary felt she was the more appropriate ruler of England and Scotland and plotted accordingly, which led to her death. She did make Elizabeth the guardian of her son, James VI of Scotland.

Elizabeth won in life; Mary won in death.

**Sonia Meltzer** is a graduate of U.T. Dallas with a master's in interdisciplinary studies with coursework in holocaust studies, literature, history, history of criticism and aesthetics.

#### The U.S. and the Holocaust (ONLINE)

This course examines America's response to one of the greatest humanitarian crises of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Rightfully so, Americans considered themselves a "nation of immigrants," but as the catastrophe of the Holocaust unfolded in Europe, the United States proved unwilling to open its doors to more than a fraction of the hundreds of thousands of people seeking refuge. Through riveting firsthand testimony of witnesses and survivors who as children endured persecution, violence and flight as their families tried to escape Hitler.

This course delves deeply into the tragic human consequences of public indifference, bureaucratic red tape and restrictive quota laws in American. Did the nation fail to live up to its ideals? This is a history to be reckoned with.

Herbert Weinstein, Ph.D. received his B.S. from Tufts University and a Ph.D. and Sloan Postdoctoral Fellowship at Princeton University in Chemical Engineering. After a 32-year career in industry and as a private consultant doing oilfield research, adjunct teaching at colleges and private tutoring, he chose to enter secondary education. Herb taught math at all levels and fundamentals of computer programming at Yavneh Academy, The Hockaday School and Parish Episcopal School and is now retired after 13 years of secondary education. "I did some great things in industry, but I feel that as a teacher, I have done even greater things; making a major difference in the lives of my students-students of all ages!"

#### The Vikings Are Coming! The Vikings Are Coming!

Set sail for two of the most exotic and mysterious Viking lands of the North Atlantic Ocean: Newfoundland and the Faroe Islands. Lands of rock, water, fog and ice, idyllic landscapes that evoke awe and amazement – stories full of discovery, mythical creatures, epic adventures and rugged survival. We'll explore the history, geography, customs and scenery of these lands.

Each lesson will include a day-by-day travelogue and photo exhibit that will make you feel like you're right there among these Viking people. The Vikings are coming, so you better be ready!

- [1] Newfoundland, in eastern Canada, was explored and briefly inhabited by a small Viking band a thousand years ago under the leadership of Leif Erikson and Gudrid Thorbjarnardottir.
- [2] The Faroe Islands are situated 300 miles east of Iceland. The Faroese people, isolated for centuries from the European mainland, reflect a hardy culture, language and attitude much like the Vikings of old.

#### Women of the United States Supreme Court

The first four women to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court were Sandra Day O'Connor, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan. By examining biographical information, their experiences prior to the Court, their appointments and confirmations and their activities on the Court, we will learn of their contributions to the nation as well as the law.

The Urinary System is responsible for more than urine production. It is the main organ system regulating blood composition. Nephrons, the functional units of the kidney, and associated collecting ducts are key structures in this regulation. The filtering of blood results in changes to volume, pressure, pH, ions, and the regulation of glucose and calcium levels. In this course, we will learn how the kidney produces urine, regulates blood composition, and the associated diseases of this system. #### Feed Your Frame: How Diet Can Defend Against Osteoporosis (ONLINE)

Bone physiology involves the structure, composition, and function of bones, which play a vital role in providing structural support, protecting organs, facilitating movement, storing minerals, and producing blood cells. Bones are dynamic, living tissues that continuously remodel throughout life. In the older age, diet plays a crucial role in preventing osteoporosis, a condition characterized by weak and brittle bones. Adequate intake of calcium and vitamin D is essential, as calcium supports bone structure while vitamin D improves calcium absorption. Additionally, protein helps maintain bone density, while fruits and vegetables provide essential minerals and antioxidants that combat bone deterioration.
